Presented are medals and memorabilia, once the possessions of Bertha ("Bert") Mary CORNELL

QSA; KSA Nursing Sister B.M. Cornell; 1914-15 Star S/Nurse B.M. Cornell Q.A.I.M.N.S.R.; BWM; AVM (Brit) Sister B.M. Cornell; Queen Alexandra Military Nursing Service Reserve Medal.

Sold with an original nursing cape; original Membership certificate (No. R400) of the Army Nursing Reserve dd. 9March 1900; original Passage document to board the Hospital Ship "Essequibo" at Belfast for 14 November 1915; pension document; invitation to meet H.R.H. The Prince of Portugal; a quantity of contemporary Boer and WWI nursing photographs including several of the recipient.

Writing a definitive biography of Bertha ("Bert") Mary CORNELL at this stage is practically impossible. However, that which follows is an expansion on the auction catalogue description above, presented in the hope that, with time, greater detail will surface sufficient to fill the very evident historical gaps.

# **BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**


Bertha ("Bert") Mary CORNELL was born Saffron Walden, Essex 21 September 1872. She was one of 7 children born to William Cornell, a basket maker, and Ellen NN. The 1881 census of England and Wales has her living with her family in the village of Wethersfield in Essex, and attending school.

At some stage, she enrolled for nurses' training at the West London Hospital, Hammersmith, London. Two photographs <sup>i</sup> in the collection date from that time.





On 9 March 1900, she was appointed to the Princess Christian's Army Nursing Services Reserve (No. R 400)  $^{\rm ii}$  and the South African Field Force  $^{\rm iv}$ .

I have found no evidence of when or how she travelled to South Africa. Presumably she disembarked in Cape Town for military nursing records indicate that she first reported to No.1 General Hospital, Wynberg in July 1901. However, it is known that her one brother, Stanley Thomas Cornell, joined the Imperial Light Infantry in 1899  $^{\rm v}$  and she therefore may have disembarked in Durban some time earlier intent on visiting him  $^{\rm vi}$ .



Amongst her possessions is an invitation she received from the then Governor, Lord Selborne, to meet the visiting Prince Royal of Portugal in August 1907 <sup>ix</sup>, the significance of which is obscure.

There is an undated series of photographs depicting Reading War Hospital No.5, Katesgrove  $\,^{\rm x}$  .






Reading War Hospital No.5, Katesgrove





In later years, as a War Veteran Pensioner <sup>xiv</sup>, she and her three sisters lived in East London, South Africa; Bertha Mary, Katherine Judith and Lois Eva Collier sharing a home.

Bertha Mary Cornell died on  $4^{th}$  July 1959 in Bryanston, Johannesburg whilst visiting her niece. She was buried in East London  $x^{v}$ .

Princess Christian's Army Nursing Service (Reserve) Nominal Roll September 1990

The certificate (illustrated) is signed *Helena*, President of Committee. This was The Princess Helena Augusta Victoria, later by marriage Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein (25 May 1846 - 9 June 1923); the third daughter and fifth child of Queen Victoria and Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha.

The Princess Christian Army Nursing Reserve was founded in March 1897 by H.R.H. Princess Christian and Mrs. Bedford-Fenwick in the Council Chamber of the Royal British Nurses' Association. The Army Nursing Service and another organised by The Princess of Wales provided nursing services during the Second Anglo-Boer War.

Following the death of Queen Victoria in 1901, The Princess of Wales, now Queen Alexandra, insisted on replacing Helena as President of the Army Nursing Service; and on 27th March 1902, Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service [QAIMNS] was established by Royal Warrant.

The 1907 Territorial and Reserve Forces Act led to the formation of QAIMNS Reserve and the Territorial Force Nursing Service (July 1908).

During the 1914-18, the various QAIMNS nursing services were mobilised and served in military hospitals and on hospital ships. In terms of the Geneva Convention, they should thus have avoided harm, but in point of fact many nurses lost their lives.

The Indian Nursing Service was inaugurated in 1888. In 1903, the name changed to the Queen Alexandra's Military Nursing Service for India [QAMNS(I)]. During the years of the British Raj, the nursing needs of the British Army and their families were met by the QAMNS(I). In 1926, this, together with the Military Families Nursing Service, was amalgamated with the QAIMNS by the War Office.

British Raj Military Hospitals included the British Military Hospital Ambala the Punjab, Delhi Military Hospital, Military Hospital Kasauli, Mody Khana Military Hospital, Station Hospital Bareilly, Station Hospital Rhaniket. I have found no reference to the Deccan British War Hospital, Kirkee.

The Imperial Light Infantry was raised in Pietermaritzburg in 1899, Officer Commanding Col. Nash. Most of the recruits were former inhabitants of Johannesburg. In the Nominal roll of the Imperial Light Infantry [WO 127], the following appears: Cornell, Stanley L/Cpl No. 479.

Her siblings Miriam Martha MANNING née Cornell, Ellen Edith MULDOON née Cornell, Katherine Judith Cornell, Lois Eva Cornell and Stanley Thomas Cornell all emigrated to South Africa.

vii Deale Bros., Bloemfontein were Arthur (d. 1933) and Samuel Frederick Deale (d. 1925). To-date they have received but passing mention in books devoted to photography in South Africa. Born in Dublin, Ireland, they appear to have established themselves c. 1893 as photographers and later as cinema proprietors and stationers, even producing their own postcards. Examples of Deale Bros. photography are housed in the National Library, Cape Town, the Albany Museum, and the State Archives Repositories, Cape Town & Bloemfontein.

A Concentration Camp was established in Pietersburg during the Anglo-Boer War and is reported to have housed almost 4000 women and children

H. M. Marie Amélie Heléne d'Orléans, Queen of Portugal (1865 - 1951) married When King Carlos of Portugal acceded to the throne of Portugal, his eldest son Infante D. Luís Filipe (1887-1908), prince of Beira - as the eldest son the Infante Duke Luís Filipe (1887-1908), prince of Beira, became the Prince Royal and Duke of Bragança. He was murdered together with his father on  $1^{\rm st}$  February, 1908 by republican radicals.

In 1915, Reading War Hospital No.1 (formerly Reading Union Workhouse and later Battle Hospital), and several local schools converted into branch hospitals, treated thousands of injured soldiers from the front lines in France and Belgium. Reading War Hospital No.5 or No.5 Katesgrove War Hospital, Reading was situated in the suburb of Katesgrove. It is well represented amongst her possessions by a collection of postcards created by Qualis Photo Coy, Fulham Rd, SW 6. [Nos.1237,1295,1296,1298,1300,1301].

The following paraphrases the recorded history of ESSEQUIBO. It was built for Royal Mail Steam Packet Company by Workman Clark & Co. at Belfast, launched on 6<sup>th</sup> July 1914 and sailed her maiden voyage on 18<sup>th</sup> November 1914 under the command of Capt. J. C. Chevet. In 1915 she was acquisitioned as a hospital ship. On 15<sup>th</sup> March 1917, she was stopped and inspected by U-54, then allowed to continue her voyage [see Im Gefecht(1)]. She was bought by Pacific Steam Navigation Company in 1922. In 1930, she was laid up until March 1935 when she was sold to Arcos Ltd and renamed Neva. She was removed from the Lloyds Register in 1957.

In the work of evacuating the sick and wounded to Canada, the Royal Canadian Naval Medical Service employed 5 hospital ships, which made an aggregate of 42 voyages. Amongst these was the "Essequibo" which made 9 Voyages and repatriated 5,106 patients.

Kirkee, Kirki or Khadki is a town in the Indian state of Maharashtra and lies just north of the city of Pune (Poona). A British India town and military cantonment established soon the Battle of Kirkee in 1817, it was home to the Royal Regiment of Artillery's 79 (Kirkee) Commando Battery. Its population in 1901 was some 10,797 persons.

Today, the Deccan War Military Hospital is The Agriculture College, Pune one of the most renowned & oldest colleges in the field of agriculture and biological research. It runs under the Mahatma Phule Krishi Vidyapeeth.
