The JPL Strange Collection in the Johannesburg Public Library houses the following two manuscripts:

- 1. Manuscript Ref: S 16.2.71 author: Mrs. Elsie Marion (Booker) Gemmell contents: unpaged Siege of Ladysmith: manuscript copy of a diary kept during the siege, 1899-1900.
- 2. Manuscript Ref: MSA 304 author: Mrs. Elsie Marion Gemmell contents: 21 cm. MS. Siege of Mafeking: Diary, 1899-1900.

The author has not had the opportunity of examining these manuscripts. The Siege of Mafeking ran from 16 October 1899 until 17 May 1900, and Mrs. Elsie Marion (Booker) Gemmell was documented as being there. The Siege of Ladysmith ran from 2 November 1899 until 28 February 1900 thus overlapping that of Mafeking, so the authorship must be in question.

From papers in the possession of the author, it appears that Mrs. Gemmell enrolled as a Nurse Probationer in South African Military Hospitals at the Old Court House, Durban on 30 November 1916. She worked at No.3 General Hospital, Durban until October 1917 when she was transferred to King's House. She was released from service on 31 January 1918.



For her service during the 1914 - 1918 war, she was awarded the British War Medal inscribed: NURSE. E.M. GEMMELL. on 28 December 1923.

The South African Woman's Who's Who: 1953, has the following entry:



GEMMELL, Mrs. ELCIE [sic] MARION, widow of Hugh Bernard Gemmell (died 1937). Daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Sexton. Born in Gloucestershire and educated in England and Durban, Natal. Is a wellknown artist in Durban; an ardent social welfare worker, and member of the following committees: Benevolent and Child Welfare Societies; Vice-President of the Women's Institute, Durban North; President the Girl Guides' Association local branch, the women's section of the United Party Club, Natal Society of Artists. Came through the Siege of Mafeking and served in the S.A.M.N.S. during the great war and holds two medals; served in the Influenza Epidemic Huts, and was awarded the Municipal Gold Medal; member of the M.O.T.H. The late Mr. Gemmell was the first M.P.C. for Durban North-West also first City Councillor for the incorporated area of Greenwood Park in Greater Durban. He served in the Bechuana Rifles during the Siege of Mafeking, when Superintendent S.A.R., joined the S.A.E.C., retired with the rank of Major after the Great War. Favourite recreations are gardening and painting. Her address is Durban, Natal.

Mrs Gemmell's stated origins are perplexing when reflected against her Death Notice (Ref: MSCE 2109/1965) in the Pietermarizburg Archives Repository which is summarized thus: **GEMMELL, ELSIE** MARION BOOKER. BORN BOOKER. BORN IN WILTSHIRE, ENGLAND. PRSP **GEMMELL,** HUGH BERNARD.

Further, the spelling of the family name differs from document to document, thus: $\mbox{\tt GEMMELL}$ and $\mbox{\tt GEMMELL}$
