Background: The Hospices de Beaune or Hôtel-Dieu de Beaune is a former charitable alms house in Beaune, Burgandy, France. It was founded in 1443 by Nicolas Rolin (1376-1462), chancellor to Philip the Good (1396-1467), Duke of Burgundy, as a hospital for the poor. The original hospital building is one of the finest examples of French fifteenth-century architecture extant. A charity wine auction has been arranged there annually since 1859, taking place on the third Sunday in November (in 1936, the 15th November) amid a three-day festival devoted to the food and wines of Burgundy called *Les Trois Glorieuses de Bourgogne* (Three Glorious Days).
